PCC meeting 10th January 2022

Building and Grounds Action Group (BAGAG).

The PCC considered a number of reports emanating from BAGAG. The minutes of the BAGAG meeting on 7th December 2021 were reviewed and received. A new revision of the Health and Safety Policy, not updated since the 2017 version, was reviewed. It updated responsibilities that were out of date and no longer applicable, but content was largely unchanged from the previous version. However there were a number of statements/requirements for which current compliance requires checking. The PCC approved the revised policy unanimously. There was a proposal to replace the current photocopier for a more reliable and eco-friendly model and the PCC approved the quotation for a 5-year lease on an ex-showroom model from a different company, with costs very similar to those for the current machine. A proposed revision to the hire

rates for organisations using our church premises was also considered. The new rates include some price increases as a result of the need for additional cleaning, an energy supplement in anticipation of increased costs, and a 5 percent supplement covering inflation. The PCC approved these revised hire charges.

New Bank Account

We now have a new bank account with Charities Aid Foundation (CAF) because of difficulties experienced getting new authorised account signatories with Barclays, our existing bank. For the moment the CAF and Barclays accounts are running concurrently, Barclays for income and CAF for outgoings, although the longer term plan is hopefully for migration completely to CAF within the next 2 years. Currently this involves periodically transferring funds from the Barclays to the CAF accounts, but in time it is hoped that people donating to the church via the Barclays account at present will be able to switch, and Paul Collis, our Treasurer, will provide the new details and any advice/assistance required to accomplish this transfer.

New Stewards

The PCC were pleased to approve the appointment of 3 new Sidesmen and welcome 2 new Greeters to the list of Stewards, noting that 6 of the existing Stewards were standing down.

Working Party for the Church Roof replacement

The issue of the leaking church roof (on the original building) had been a problem almost since it was first built due to the design (flat roof with different levels and parapets) and a lot of money had been spent on repairs which were never a permanent solution. Some time ago we obtained designs and likely costs to completely replace the roof, but the costs were prohibitive and also showed the PCC that it wasn't clear what it was desirable to achieve. After a period of reflection, while the project has been on hold, Jeremy now proposed setting up a small Working Party (representative of the church, but including some with relevant expertise) to consider all the options, define what we want from the building (which might also be affected internally by any new roof design), produce the design, or get it designed and put the work out to tender. Some church members had already been approached and the PCC suggested some others for consideration. These others will be considered by Standing Committee as to who should be approached to join.

One-off/spontaneous donations, mainly from outside the church

There had been occasions, including recently, when non-church members had asked to donate either to our church or to a disaster relief charity via the church as an appreciation for events/services they had attended at Christ Church. This had posed difficulty for those receiving the enquiry, since we do not encourage donations for our own use from outside our membership and we do not have a designated charity to divert donations to. After considering this issue the PCC considered that we should divert any such donations to a relevant disaster relief fund which will be decided by Global Mission Action Group (GMAG), but were not in favour of having collection boxes left out on a long-term basis, for security reasons.

THE SAD END OF A GOOD KING – Revd Canon Dele Agbelusi

Many of us would not think much of Uzziah, one of the kings of Judah if not for Isaiah 6:1 where the commissioning of Isaiah was opened with the words: *“In the year that King Uzziah died, I saw the Lord, high and exalted, seated on a throne...”* When Isaiah wrote, that he was called in the year King Uzziah died, he said a lot. It is to say, “In the year a great and wise king died.” But it is also to say, “In the year a great and wise king, who had a tragic end, died.” Isaiah had great reason to be discouraged and disillusioned at the death of King Uzziah, because a great king had passed away, and because his life ended tragically. Yet despite it all, he saw the enthroned LORD God who was greater than any earthly king, whose kingdom is from everlasting to everlasting.

King Uzziah, meaning “my strength is God”, also referred to as Azariah in 2 Kings 15, was one of the good kings of Judah. In many ways he honoured God and he had a lot of success and power. Yet even good kings have their problems, and Uzziah didn’t end well. He died a leper – because he could not handle his success and power. 2 Kings 15:5 tells us that he fell from grace to grass. However, it is in 2 Chronicles 26 that we have the full gist of his life.

According to 2 Chronicles 26, He began his reign when he was only 16 years old (v.3), by the direct choice of the people. He reigned during the ministry of Zechariah the prophet (26:5), who instructed him in the fear and ways of God and as long as he sought the Lord, God gave him success. He defeated the Philistines and took many of their cities, and also kept the Ammonites in tribute (26:6-8). He was internationally famous as a strong king (26:8). He was an ambitious builder and skilled in agriculture (26:9-10)."

Everything seemed to go his way. But then, the strength and success went to his head. Arrogant and proud, he fell. One day, contemptuous of God, he walked into the Temple of God like he owned it and took over, burning incense on the Incense Altar.” (verses 15 and 16 The Message). The priests tried to stop him, but the King insisted on forcing his way into the temple to offer incense.

The priest Azariah, backed up by eighty brave priests of God confronted king Uzziah: *“You must not, you cannot do this—only the Aaronite priests, especially consecrated for the work, are permitted to burn incense. Get out of God's Temple; you are unfaithful and a disgrace!”* But Uzziah, censer in hand, was already in the middle of doing it and angrily rebuffed the priests. (vv. 17-18 The Message). Uzziah violated what had become a general principle in God’s dealing with Israel: that no king should at the same time be a priest. The offices of prophet, priest, and king should not be combined in one man – UNTIL the Messiah, Jesus the LORD, who fulfilled all three offices.

Uzziah’s problem was that he was not content with the authority God had given him and wanted to add priestly functions to his royal power. **Absolute power, however, has no place in God’s kingdom.**

“Despite the seriousness of what Uzziah had done, God still did not act until Uzziah became angry.” Angry. Mad. It was like he was thinking in his mind, “don’t you know who I am? You’re telling me to go out? How dare you reprove me! Don’t you know I am the king with powers? And you’re humiliating me before everyone and trying to prevent me from doing this. My fame has spread to Egypt. How dare you rebuke me! **Uzziah’s estimation of himself was this: “I’m above the law, rebuke or criticism.”**

Uzziah came into the temple as an arrogant king, and he left as a humiliated leper. Death was the actual penalty enjoined by the law for his crime (Numbers 18:7), and leprosy was really that—a living death, prolonged and intensified." "The leprosy broke out on his forehead so he could not hide his shame; though it is probable it was also in the rest of his body.

Many Christians, church leaders and churches start out humbly, relying upon the Lord, but they grow, their fame spreads, they acquire wealth and pride creeps in then they collapse. Uzziah is just one case of a warning in the Bible. His earlier life was one of a prayerful leader who was helped by God. And it ended with him being an excluded leper. That happens all the time. And if you say, "that will never happen to me", consider the experience of Peter. He proudly boasted that he would never deny the Lord Jesus. But he did, thrice. **Let anyone who thinks he stands, take heed lest he fall.**

Pride grows. It spreads like gangrene. It catches you off guard. It doesn't happen all of a sudden. There is usually a progression. A high view of yourself which increases and changes, so often, with the more victories and success you have.

This is a warning for us. We see a man who sought the Lord, and God made him prosper as king. And then we see his life end as an excluded leper. Fame, celebrity status, are fertile grounds for the seeds of pride to grow rapidly upon. The humble man looks for authority and wants to get under it, but the proud man has trouble with authority, especially biblical authority. Proverbs 29:23 says: "One's pride will bring him low, but he who is lowly in spirit, will obtain honour." Uzziah's pride brought him low. Due to his leprosy, he lived the rest of his life in quarantine; he was not permitted to set foot in The Temple of God again. How tragic?

Open Doors World Watch List Launch to Parliament (online) – 19 January 2022 – Paul Bailey

For the past 20 years **North Korea** has been the worst place in the world to live in terms of religious persecution. If the authorities discover that someone is a Christian they may be sent to a labour camp (where they are often worked to death) or executed. There has been an increase in surveillance, anti-religion legislation, arrests, violence and closure of house churches. Yet, they are no longer in the ignominious position at the top of the **World Watch List**. Since the Taliban took over **Afghanistan**, persecution already at a high level, has only got worse. Christians are being hunted down systematically and if discovered, men are executed whilst women and girls face enslavement or imprisonment and a lifetime of abuse. Afghanistan is now the most dangerous and deadly place to be a Christian.

Open Doors' extensive and thorough research shows that as many as **360 million** Christians across 76 countries face high or extreme levels of persecution and discrimination – up from 340 million last year. Much of this increase may be due to Islamist extremists being emboldened by the withdrawal of international protection of human rights leading to the take-over of Afghanistan. Certainly jihadist violence against Christians has increased in west **Africa**, the **Middle East** and countries such as **Indonesia**. Christians killed for their faith last year totalled **5,898**, 79% of whom were

in **Nigeria**, 11% in **Pakistan**.

Despite the horror for many Christians living under nationalistic or religious extremism or communist oppression, there are **reasons for hope**. A number of NGOs including Open Doors bring their professionalism and expertise to support the persecuted church around the world. Open Doors has branches in 23 countries and serves people in over 60 countries. The dedication and love of those who serve is immense, but perhaps the most **remarkable stories** come from those who show faith and resilience in the most traumatic and tragic circumstances.

In North Korea, **Bae** (not her real name) and her husband were sent to a remote village, sentenced to a lifetime of back-breaking hard labour just for owning a Bible. Always on the brink of starvation she forages in the forest to try to stem her hunger. She once **escaped** and crossed the border into China where Open Doors **fieldworkers** linked up with her, taking her to a safe house. She enjoyed the freedom of being able to talk and worship aloud, as well as being given food, medicine and a Bible. **Amazingly she chose not stay** but return to N Korea where she could share what she had been given with her 'underground' church.

In a letter she wrote to Open Doors she says, "Whenever I open my eyes in the morning, **I feel the presence of our Father**" and "From the perspective of other people, our suffering must seem like a cursed life; however, **this suffering is a blessing from our Father** who allowed it in our life because it is **a shortcut to the Father**." An astounding example of faith and of the effectiveness and bravery of support workers who also risk a great deal doing God's work. Many of us wrote Christmas cards in church in November sending seasons greetings to our local MPs and inviting them to attend the WWL launch. Whilst over 130 Parliamentarians had agreed to attend, in the end there were 93 who attended the online event. Sadly, neither Bim Afolami nor Daisy Cooper attended the event but lobbying them is a long term undertaking and I would ask for **continued prayers** for their participation in the future in FoRB issues, which I will inform them of through the coming year.

Also, please **give thanks to God** that:

- There has been significant progress in the main purpose of the WWL reports over the years, namely to **raise the profile of religious persecution** and to lobby the Government to use its diplomatic and trade powers to protect Freedom of Religion or Belief (FoRB) around the world.
- Due to the work of Open Doors and some very committed MPs, the **largest APPG** (All-Party Parliamentary Group) in Westminster is the Freedom of Religion or Belief one.
- The UK Government are hosting 33 other countries at the **International Ministerial for FoRB** in July
- The persecution of Christians around the world is firmly **on the political and media agenda**

Caring for Creation

RSPB Big Garden Birdwatch


By the time *>imprint<* comes out the RSPB Big Garden Birdwatch survey should be underway, running from **Friday 28th to Sunday 30th January**, but it's still not too late to take part. Simply count the highest number of birds, of each species, you see at any one time, that land in your garden, or whichever location you choose, during a single hour. Christ Church Caring for Creation (C4) are intending to host a group session after church on Sunday 30th which you are welcome to join, surveying the birds that land in our church grounds, but you can still do a separate one at home. Go to <https://rspb.org.uk/get-involved/activities/birdwatch/> to sign up and download the tally sheet and instructions. Doing this gives the RSPB useful information on species abundance or decline in different parts of the country, since sadly we have lost 38 million birds from UK in the last 50 years, and this information will help them update their statistics and look after places where birdlife and wildlife can thrive.

Christ Church's Solar Panels

C4 thought it would be of interest to church members to revive occasional reports of how our solar panels are doing. Currently, not much, understandably, being winter with not much sun and reduced daylight hours, but the chart here gives the figures and visual representation of the monthly amount the panels have generated and how much has been exported to the grid since last summer. In looking at this information, it's important to bear in mind that just because we export some of our solar generated electricity (quite a lot in the summer), we can only export what we don't use at any given time. We still need to buy electricity from our renewable energy supplier at times when our demand exceeds what we can generate, including night-times or during poor weather (when we generate nothing, or very little).

Having discussed the proposed Christ Church climate declaration/recognition and also the Lifestyle section of the Eco Church survey at its meeting on 15th December, C4 went on to look at another section of the survey, Community and Global Engagement, at its 17th January meeting, concluding there could be quite a bit of work to do in this area to meet the criteria for a bronze Eco Church award. Ideas for potential activities for Christ Church participation in the next Sustainable St Albans Sustainability Festival (SustFest22), from Sunday 15th to Tuesday 31st May 2022, were also discussed. Any events planned require registration by 14th March.

The next C4 meeting is scheduled for 21st February, when it's planned to discuss the Worship and Teaching section of the Eco Church survey amongst other topics. All church members are welcome to attend. The venue/format of the meeting (whether in person or online) will be notified shortly, via the e-news-sheet.
